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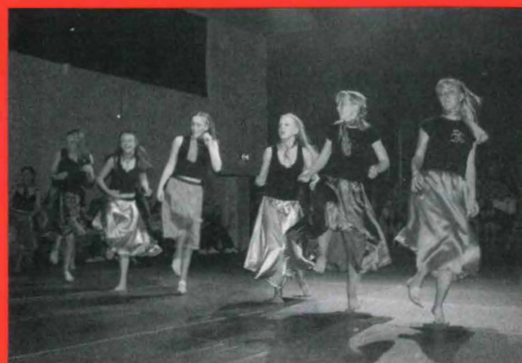
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FANTASTIC MOVEMENT EVENING

In February this year, 12 'A' level Spanish students, accompanied by Mrs Leatherbarrow and Mr Bacon, flew to Malaga in Spain to immerse themselves in the Spanish language and culture. 'We stayed in the Hostel Derby which overlooked the harbour,' said Paul Hirst, 'and we were able to use the lounge for our daily Spanish lessons. During the week we went on a tour of Malaga and visited the castle, the fortress, the cathedral and harbour. On Tuesday we caught the bus to Granada where we visited the world famous Alhambra Palace. It was a magnificent building, with many courtyards and fountains, in true Arabic style. On Thursday, we went to the local English newspaper, 'Sur', to see the paper printed and we had our photograph taken for the following week's edition. We had plenty of opportunities to use our Spanish and converse with the local inhabitants. On our last evening, we watched an authentic display of true flamenco music and dancing, which was a real taste of Spain. We had a very enjoyable visit and gained a flavour of the real Spain!'



SCIENCE IN FRANCE - C'EST MAGNIFIQUE

In September 2002, a group of almost forty students from Year 8 and five members of staff took part in a visit to study science in France and to practise their French at the same time. The study visit was action packed and involved staying in three different hotels. There was a tour of La Rance Hydrodam, the biggest tidal barrier in Europe and this was followed by a visit to the beautiful town of Saint Malo, where students had the opportunity of shopping for souvenirs and trying out their very best French. The following day was spent at the Futuroscope where students spent time in three different cinemas, one of which was in 3D. There were also some incredible simulations that left all the visitors stunned and amazed. The next day, the group travelled to Paris, where they were taken on a conducted tour of the city, including a visit to the top of the Eiffel Tower. Whilst in Paris, the group spent time at La Cite Science Museum where they boarded a simulated journey in the space shuttle, went into a soundproofed room that contained invisible drums - and were allowed to make as much noise as possible - and some students conducted science experiments while other students watched a film about the planets, in French! Miss Williamson commented that, 'The group was a credit to the school' and that the teachers had received many compliments about the behaviour of the group during the various stages of the visit.

Y11 PRESENTATION

On Friday the 16th of May, Y11 received their Records of Achievement in a presentation in the school hall. 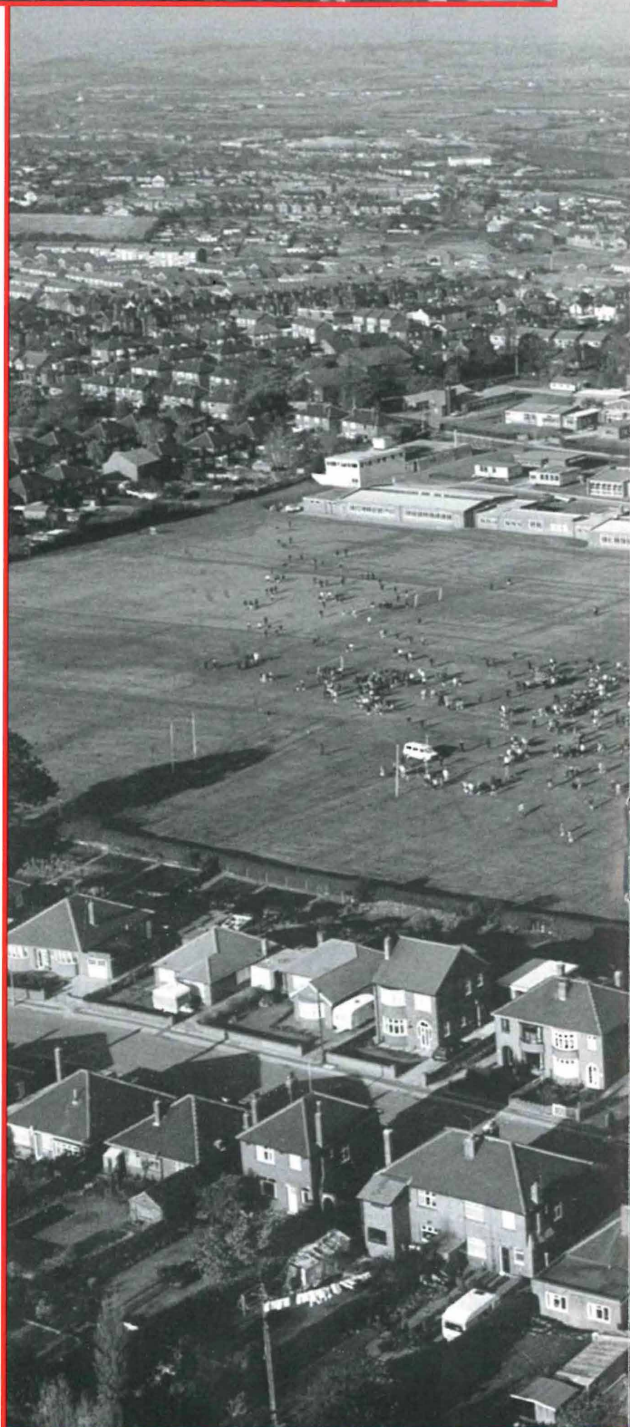
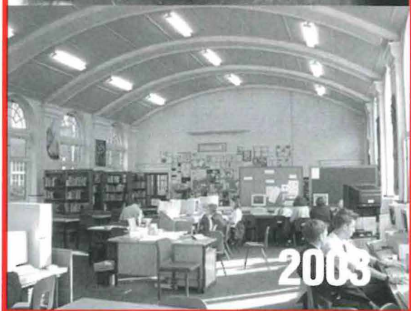
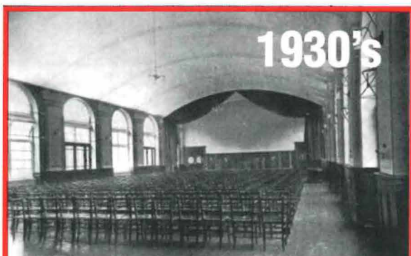
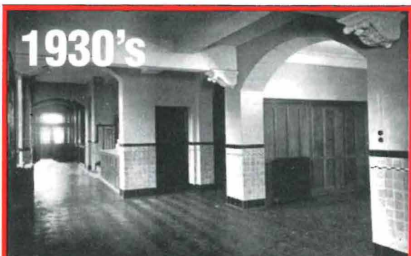
BUILDING BRIDGES

ACTIVE IN SPAIN

Last summer, 18 students and two members of staff flew to the Navarra region of Spain to take part in a cultural exchange and to fulfil part of the Duke of Edinburgh Gold Award. The group stayed in the local Youth Hostel and took part in a range of activities organised by the Spanish company Sedena. Each day began with breakfast at 8.30 a.m. and was followed by a morning activity. Lunch was either taken at the Hostel or consisted of a packed lunch if we were out all day. The activities that we took part in ranged from white water rafting, canoeing, mountain biking through to trying our hands at archery. We spent a challenging morning rock climbing and we undertook a hike through the villages and the lower hills of the Pyrenees. We also went on three excursions: one to Pamplona, but we arrived too late to see the bull race (which was at 8.00 a.m.) and to Hundarribia which was on the coast. Our final excursion was to San Sebastian which also included a visit to the wonderful aquarium where you can observe sharks, mantas and turtles from glass tunnels. It was a highly active week but one we shall all remember for some time.



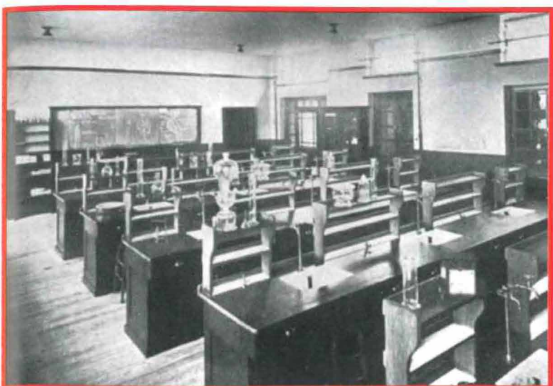
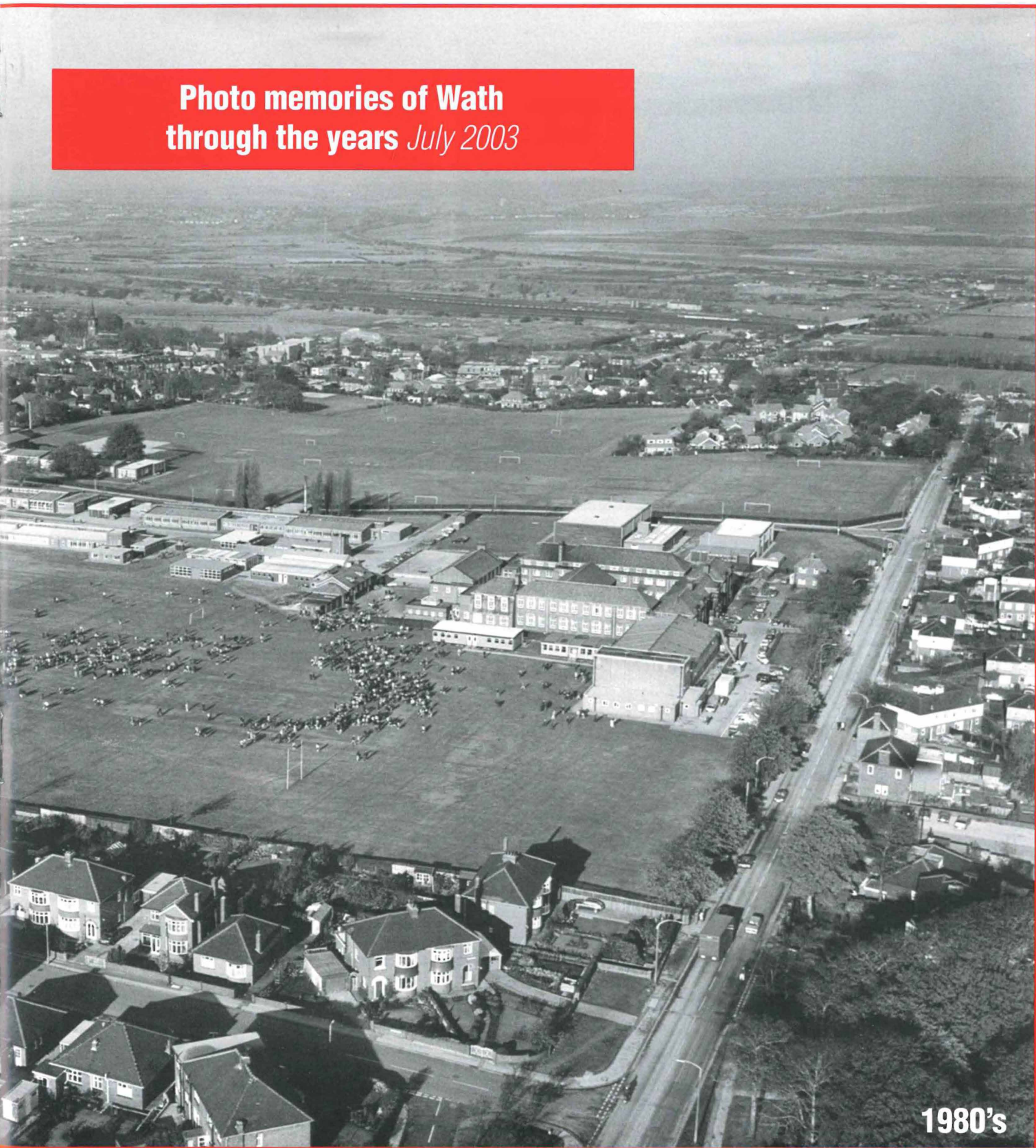

BLOIS FRENCH EXCHANGE



At the beginning of November, a group of French students arrived from our partner school in Blois. The group stayed with families from the Wath area and took part in a range of different activities, from learning how to cook the perfect curry as demonstrated by Mrs Morley and Mrs Gracey, to visits to the historic city of York and Wakefield Mining Museum.

The group also spent time in school on a variety of language activities. Victoria Mower, in her report on the exchange, wrote, 'We all found the experience very enriching and worthwhile and we feel that we have made many new friends. We are also looking forward to returning to Blois to experience French life and culture first hand. Whilst in Blois, we will be staying with a French family, undertaking work experience and involving ourselves in a range of language based activities.'

BUSINESS IN BRUSSELS

The trip included visits to three very different businesses - the Belle Vue Brewery, the National Bank of Belgium and the Electrabel Nuclear Power Plant. Stephen Williams, Y12 wrote in his account of the visit: 'Well, what can you say about a visit that had it all: culture, education and fun. The culture came in the form of the wonderful city of Brussels which impressed many of us for different reasons. The second city of Antwerp received just as much admiration. The education came in many different guises, be it learning about how a nuclear power plant was run to finding out about the ancient coinage of the surrounding area to sampling a small amount of beer at the brewery. Overall, how could I sum up the trip? Well, apart from the search we had leaving the UK, it was a trip that offered something for everyone - great hospitality, great food and a great time.'

COMENIUS VISIT TO SICILY AS MOUNT ETNA ERUPTS!

As part of the school's commitment to developing international links and funded by the British Council, two members of staff and two students, Harry Gregory and Tara Dudill, both in Y9, travelled to Acireale on the island of Sicily, to meet up with other schools and students from our partnership schools and to take part in an international conference. Whilst in Sicily, the group stayed with Italian families and also learned some Italian into the bargain.

The conference was a great success but the most outstanding thing that all of the group will never forget is, that whilst there, Mount Etna erupted, sending lava and ash across the whole area and disrupting all communication across the island.

SOMME BATTLEFIELDS VISIT

At the end of September, 43 students and 5 members of staff took part in what has become an annual study visit to the battlefields of the Somme. This visit enables students to see for themselves the horrors of the First World War. The first day was spent at Ypres and included visits to Sanctuary Wood, the scene of a bitter battle in 1916. This was followed by a visit to Tyne Cot Cemetery, Essex Farm Cemetery and Passchendaele which is often said to be the site of the bloodiest battle in history. This very moving day was followed by a visit to the Somme and the battlefields of Pozieres and Thiepval, which has a 150 feet high memorial which commemorates the 73,000 men who died on the Somme and who have no known grave.

The following day saw a visit to the historic town of Bruges, with the opportunity to spend some time in the shops before returning to Ypres and attend the Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate. The final day included a visit to the Vimy Memorial Park and the underground tunnels.

Alison Stone, as part of her diary of the visit, wrote: 'After experiencing the battlefields visit for the third time this year, I decided to take a different approach to the way I saw things. Instead of focusing entirely on the horror and pain that war brought, I decided to study the men who were shot at dawn and to try and comprehend what they must have experienced prior to their executions. On Thursday evening the coach stopped at what seemed to be yet another of the small white and peaceful cemeteries. At first it seemed to be another beautiful little cemetery in Belgium. It was only when the bus stopped and Mr Barlow played a video about soldiers executed at dawn for "crimes against their country", that I realised why we were there.

The sun, just setting, filled the cemetery with a great sense of peace. Here, in the tranquillity of the red brick cemetery, lay three soldiers who suffered the same fate as the men mentioned in the video. For me, this was the most moving part of the entire visit. It was at this point that I realised what a harsh waste of life it had been to execute three men. It was no consolation that all three men had later been given official pardons.'

The battlefields visit is a very moving experience and continues to be popular with Wath students.

Congratulations and well done to all the girls who took part.

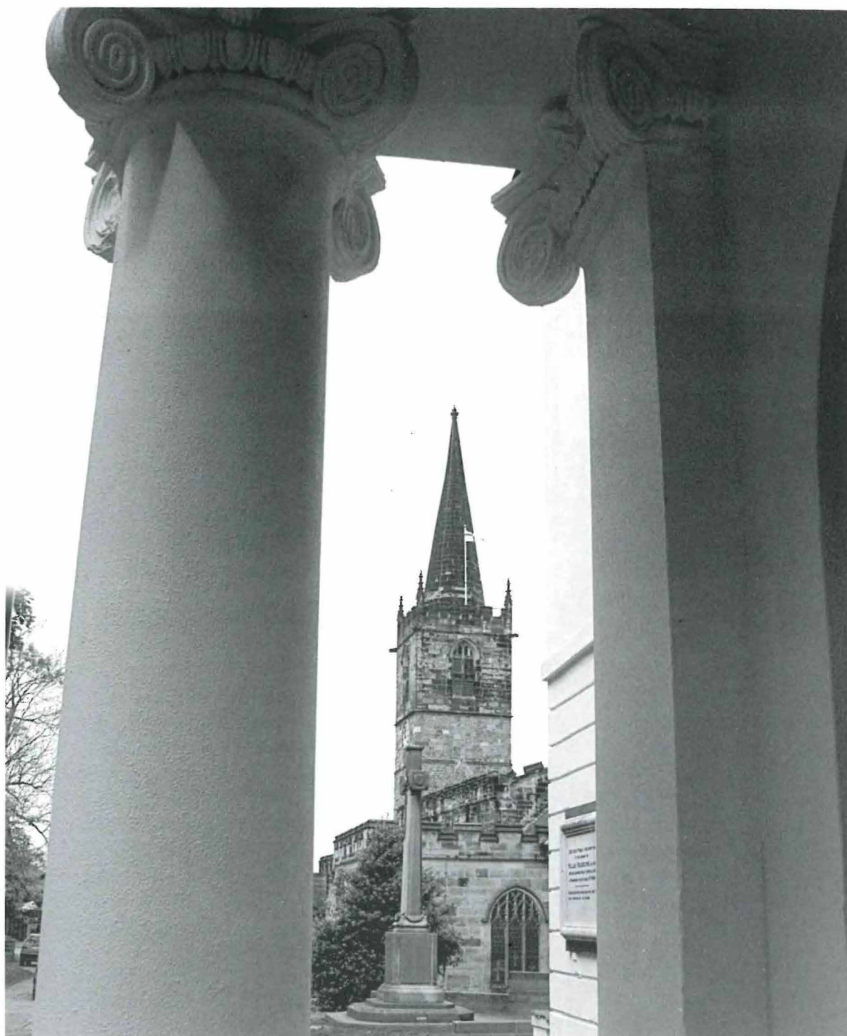
SIGHTS AND SOUNDS AT THE PARISH CHURCH
