The only way to start is by congratulating our students who took their examinations in 2008. Our Year 11s produced the school's best ever GCSE results – by a distance. And our Year 13s performed so well that the local press were able to name Wath as the best A Level state school in South Yorkshire. Well done students – and parents and staff too. It was a real team effort. In announcing the results Mr Powell said that we were allowed a week to celebrate. But then it was back to the hard work which, we hope, will lead to an even better performance in 2009.

Hard work doesn't only take place in the classroom, though, as you'll see if you read on.

WHAT'S NEW?

During the past year the school has been able to make use of a number of new facilities. Some of these are small, such as the greenhouse which has appeared next to our Inclusion Centre and which means that our students can now study Horticulture without leaving the school site. Some of the new facilities are big, such as our all-weather pitch and Wath Leisure Centre – a very welcome neighbour. The PE Department are delighted that outdoor sport can now continue all year round, and that students can now spend their swimming lessons actually swimming rather than walking to and from the old pool in the centre of Wath!

Slightly further afield, the St Mary's Centre at Rawmarsh opened in December. The Centre, which is managed jointly by ourselves, Rawmarsh, Saint Pius and Swirton schools, allows us to support students who find it difficult to cope with a full week in a normal school setting. It is also a base for new vocational courses such as Catering, as chefs Kyle Molyneux and Steven Vickers are happy to demonstrate.



WHAT A COLLECTION!

Whether we're collecting for sports equipment, books or computers, you always deliver the goods. The vouchers come into school in their thousands. But do they make a difference? They certainly do. Earlier this year, for example, we obtained a new laptop computer under the Tesco 'Computers for Schools' scheme. This means that we now have a machine which can be borrowed, by both students and staff, when there is a need to do IT work 'on the move' such as when carrying out experiments. 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Spotlight on Science

SHERLOCK BONES

A group of Year 9 students investigated 'The Mysterious Case of the Human Body' (or, more specifically, the forensic science of the human skeleton). The day, led by Dr Danyelle Thickett, introduced the skeleton as a whole and initially examined its function.

The students then investigated and tried to catalogue skeletal finds, identifying the missing parts and explaining why those parts might be missing. They learnt how to determine the sex and age of an individual from the remains of a body. According to Laura Parish, one of the students who took part:

'We grew in confidence in our practical skills and enjoyed ourselves. It was a really fascinating day.'

The day was rounded off by looking at some skeletons and trying to identify what conditions these individuals might have had, relating bone changes to arthritis, ageing and other illnesses.



GETTING CLOSE TO NATURE

During the first week after the Spring half-term break, 90 Year 7 students visited the Old Moor Wetlands Centre. This visit tied in with the topics that the students were covering in the classroom. They investigated the relationships between the animals, their habitats and environments, looking at everything from meadow creatures and insects to the larger animals which live on the wetlands.

The day included a look at how the environment has been managed to become a safe haven for a large number of resident animals and birds, and also for those which pass through on migration.

The students also developed their group work and organisational skills in order to carry out various tasks. Activities included pond dipping, bird watching and observing the creatures of the woodlands and meadows.



UNIVERSITY LINKS

Our Year 11 'triple science' students were invited to take part in a science poster competition organised by Sheffield Hallam University. The aim was to educate the students about how research science work is presented at universities and conferences, and to get them to present some of their own practical work in a similar way. This work was on top of their already heavy workload.

Dawn Hadden and Craig Fox, from the university, came into school on March 20th to judge the posters. Dawn and Craig were impressed by the high standard of both presentation and scientific content. The nine students who submitted entries all received Easter Eggs in recognition of their efforts and talents. Melissa Hutchinson was the overall winner, receiving a £20 HMV voucher. Well done to all those who participated, and particular congratulations to Melissa.

OUT IN THE WILD

Students in Year 13 took to the great outdoors as part of their week-long field course, looking at the ecology of Malham Tarn, near Settle in North Yorkshire.

As part of their A Level course students are expected to study the practical side of ecology – and there's no better way than in wellies and the rain! The students investigated an upland limestone stream, the surrounding wooded area and the tarn's unique history which makes it a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) and a Ramsar site – one of the few not only in Britain but in the world. They also learnt how the site is managed year on year so that it remains a valuable resource for the future.

On more than one occasion the students got extremely wet and cold, but remained in tremendous spirit with regular exhibitions of designer wellies and raincoats. They managed to master the techniques used in trapping mammals for study. Mainly vole and wood mice were captured – and released unharmed after many 'oohs' and 'aahs'.

The students managed to mix business and pleasure during the week, and they were a pleasure to be with.



THE CUTTING EDGE OF TECHNOLOGY

Once again, staff from Reading University visited the school to give our Year 12 scientists the opportunity to participate in Biotechnology experiments. Each student took part in a four-hour session where they were able to extract the genetic material from bacteria and perform a 'DNA' fingerprint using a gel electrophoresis technique. Dr John Schollar led the session, and the students appreciated his humour as well as respecting his knowledge and experience. As ever he was impressed with the attitude and manners of the students, and by their ability to perform practical work and broaden their knowledge and understanding of this area of Biology.

DON'T WASTE YOUR LIFE – COMENIUS GOES FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH

It's been another busy and successful year for the Wath Comenius group. Our final year on the teenage culture project 'Don't Waste Your Life' has seen Maria Fairbank-Azcarate, Megan Rees and Jessica Wood putting together a superb teen magazine focusing on good and bad role models. Thomas Andrews and David Pettinger researched the support networks available to teenagers in school and the local community, as well as looking at our students' aspirations – with some interesting results! Chloe Shaw and Katie Waddington compiled data on drug awareness for a comparative analysis with our partner schools.

The project ended with Charlotte Sandham-Mulholland and Scott Westoby representing Wath at a conference in Cosenza, Italy. The conference was attended by staff and students from our partner schools in Finland and Hungary as well as our Italian hosts. You can read Charlotte's own account of the experience, but I must mention Mr Rolling who wowed us with his culinary talents, cooking lunch for the English party at the home of the Italian coordinator Catia Mele. And yes, he did cook pasta!

The project may have ended, but Comenius most certainly has not. A new project for 2009-2011 will focus on raising awareness of the carbon footprint of our schools, staff and students. The title of the project is 'Making a World of Difference'. Wath Comprehensive will remain the lead school for this project, and our Year 8 students have already been researching into the culture and schools of our new partners from Barcelona in Spain and Bochum in Germany who will be joining us.

Finally, a big thank you to Laura and Charlotte Josephs in Year 11 who have been working on the Comenius website for the past year and a half. They have collated the work produced by students from Wath and our partner schools. The site will be linked to the official school website and can be viewed soon. Well done girls! *Mrs M Gracey*



TOURING THE CONTINENT

As Wath is a specialist Language College, it is no surprise that activities with an international dimension feature prominently in our school life. This doesn't just mean overseas study visits, but we do organise a number of these.

In November a Year 11 group visited Paris and saw such iconic sights as the Eiffel Tower, the Cathedral of Notre Dame, the Sacre Coeur at Montmartre and the Louvre museum. The students competed to recreate the best Mona Lisa. The more adventurous tried snails and frogs' legs!

Santander in Northern Spain was the destination for some of our Year 8 students. Everyone had a great time in spite of the wet weather, visiting 22000 year-old caves, ancient villages and monasteries, taking part in Flamenco and Salsa dancing lessons and sampling the local cuisine.

The weather was kinder to the Year 9 group who visited Munich in March – although they did get to throw snowballs at each other when they visited the fairytale castle of Neuschwanstein. The Allianz Stadium, home to Bayern Munich FC, provided a contrast, but the most memorable experience was the Dachau concentration camp. The day there provided a chilling reminder of the dangers of intolerance.

By the time you read this, some lucky Year 7 students will just have returned from a week packed with exciting adventures – from zip-wire rides and assault courses to visits to the local market and chocolate factory – at Château Beaumont in Normandy, France. But we guarantee that the group will have been immersed in the French language and culture too.

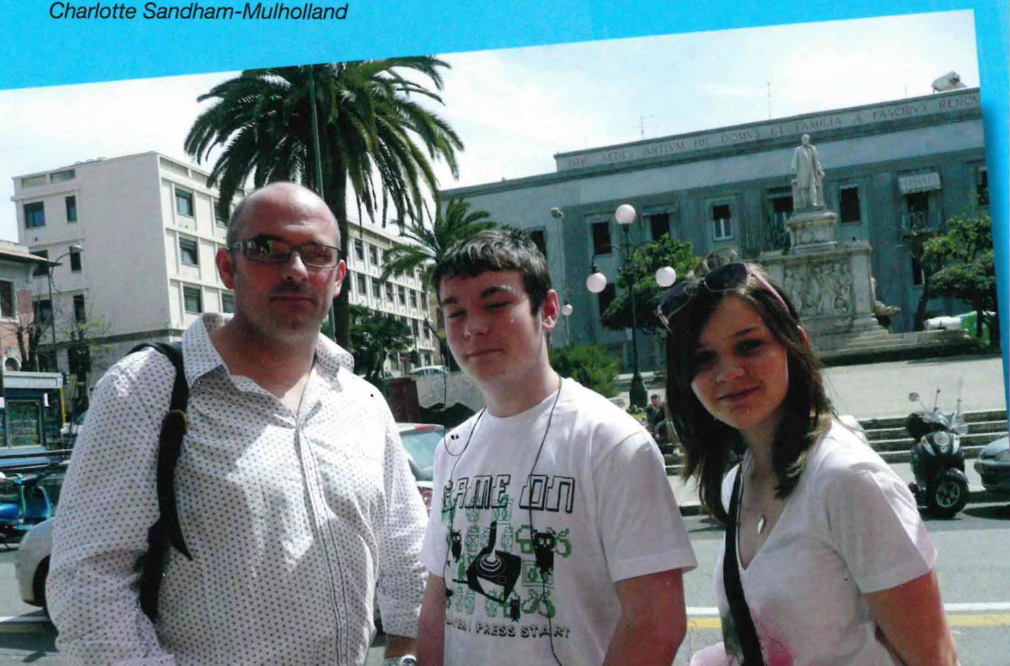
For our Sixth Form students, the opportunity to take part in international work experience is unmissable. Most return to school with a new-found confidence in themselves. This year our French students have worked in schools in Saint Etienne. One student, Charlotte Cowen, said, 'although there were times when we found it difficult to communicate with people ... we now know that it was definitely the best thing that we could have done in order to improve our French. After having been back into our routine of Sixth Form and of our French lessons, it is clear to see that we are all much better.' Our German students will have the same chance to improve their language skills when they go on work experience to Riesa in July. Riesa is twinned with Rotherham so we already have great links with the town. Next year we plan to add a Spanish work experience visit, so watch this space!

COMENIUS – THROUGH A STUDENT'S EYES

For our Comenius project two representatives of our school's Comenius group – Scott Westoby and myself – were picked to accompany Mrs Gracey and Mr Rolling to Cosenza in Italy to share the information we had gathered about what people our age like to do in their spare time. Before we went we had to prepare a presentation of our information to show to the other schools.

When we arrived in Italy I couldn't wait to meet my host family. Luckily I didn't have to wait long. Viviana and her family were really nice and we spent the first afternoon looking around the shops. On the Tuesday we went to school with our hosts and had a tour of the school. The school was big and spaced out. The students finished at different times between 12.30 and 2.00 pm. There was no lunch break. Later that day my host family took me to a restaurant. On the Wednesday I met the students from our partner schools in Hungary and Finland before we gave our presentations to them, and we then worked together on a magazine. The magazine is called 'Teen Euro' and will be distributed to all the schools involved. Wath designed the front cover! On Thursday we all went on a trip to a museum of Greek antiquities, and then to the beach where we enjoyed the sunshine, before we went home on Friday morning.

A REWARDING (OR SHOULD IT BE AWARDING) YEAR

It's certainly been a truly rewarding year for Wath Comprehensive School: A Language College. We've received so many awards that we'll soon need a new trophy cabinet!

In October we gained the International School Award (ISA) for the third time running. This means that, in 2011, we will have been an ISA school for 10 years. Only nine schools in the country have held the ISA for this long. The ISA scheme is supported and funded by the Government and the British Council. It helps schools to form and develop international partnerships, achieve curriculum goals and encourage an international ethos. The British Council was very impressed with our 'excellent portfolio' of international work. In addition to the ISA award itself, we now hold a prestigious 10th anniversary trophy. These were presented to us by the BBC's George Alagiah and Fergal Keane at a ceremony in Birmingham in March.

During the year representatives of the school also travelled to the Education Business Awards ceremony at Arsenal's Emirates Stadium in London. We entered two categories: the Modern Languages Award (for provision of a first-class environment for teaching Modern Languages) and the Educational Visits Award (for demonstrating a commitment to providing students with a range of subject-specific educational visits in order to further their learning experience). Wath Comprehensive achieved a proud second place, beating three other schools in our categories.

BREAKING NEWS! We have just been notified that we are winners of a European Award for Languages. This award, supported by the European Commission and co-ordinated in the UK by the National Centre for Languages, recognises creative ways of improving the quality of language teaching, motivating students and making the best use of available resources. We have been recognised because of our use of Talk Now – a programme of self-taught languages which is used by our Year 12 students, learners from the local community and many staff members. The award was presented by Sir Trevor McDonald at a ceremony in Bristol in June.

CLOSER TO HOME

One of our priorities as a specialist school is to support our local community, and this year has been a busy one for the community side of the Language College.

We've been involved in the Cook and Eat programme, which aims to encourage students and their parents to enjoy cooking together and to learn how to cook tasty and healthy food. As well as our own students, parents and staff being involved, we've supported West Melton and Wath Victoria Primary Schools in running this programme too.

We've also worked closely with Groundwork Dearne Valley, a local environmental charity. A group of our Year 9 boys have attended various BMX events, including the opening of the new BMX track at Brampton. This partnership will continue as we work to improve other local parks, starting with Strathmore Park in Wath.

Continuing with the theme of improving our community, Year 8, Year 9 and Sixth Form students told the Wentworth North Area Assembly about improvements they would like to see made to the local area, by completing a total of 200 questionnaires. The results of the survey will be published soon and the Assembly will decide which projects to fund.

And our community spirit doesn't end there! Students and staff were involved in the annual Wath Festival of Music and Dance in May. Students face painted and competed in 'Wath's Got Talent', as well as participating in concerts during the run-up to the festival weekend. The school will also be represented at the Wath Town Gala on 11th July.

A CELEBRATION EVENING FOR LANGUAGES

We wanted to celebrate the hard work, successes and achievements of all our students who are involved with languages. We also wanted to show how much fun languages can be and all the different things you can do if you learn a language. So, on 2nd April 2009, Wath Comprehensive School held its first Languages Celebration Evening – a Language College/Modern Foreign Languages Department joint production.

The evening showcased the huge talents of our students and we were treated to songs, dance, plays and even a cookery demonstration – all created by our students and staff and all involving languages. We also heard from the students themselves about various foreign visits and projects. One of the many highlights of the evening was the award of prizes to our 'Top Performers' and 'Most Improved Language Students'. Mr Powell, Deputy Headteacher, described the occasion as 'a highly entertaining mix'. He said that it was 'great to see the photos and videos created by our students, and interesting to hear them talk about their experiences so confidently. It was clear to see that ... the international dimension of the school ... made students significantly more positive in their outlook'.

An Enterprising Year

SAFE HAVENS – A STUDENT RESPONSE TO BULLYING

Sadly, very few schools can claim to be free of bullying. But at Wath Comprehensive we take the issue very seriously, and our experience is that the most effective methods of tackling bullying are those which involve the students themselves.

Safe Havens is a young person's mental and emotional well-being service which supports students aged 11 to 16 in Wath Comprehensive School. We offer support for a variety of issues and problems, especially bullying. The impetus for the project came as a result of serious concerns raised in the school community by young people, staff and parents regarding the nature, extent and severity of bullying in schools. Therefore this unique initiative was developed by young people, is led by young people and is for young people.

We are getting stronger and stronger. The service that we provide at Wath remains a significant gap in provision in some schools. Wath Young People's Centre, which is on our site, provides us with the space, staff support and resources necessary for us to undertake our work.

The Safe Havens Mission is to provide the best possible mental and emotional well-being targeted support to young people.

There isn't space here to list all the Safe Havens Objectives, but they include:

- Providing a safe and friendly place to go with something to do.
- Making young people feel good about themselves.
- Acknowledging and overcoming unnecessary and unjustifiable barriers which prevent young people from staying safe, being healthy, enjoying and achieving, achieving economic well-being and making a positive contribution.
- Empowering young people to enable them to lead fulfilled lives and reach their full potential.

Our current plans include expanding the scheme into eight other secondary schools. We are applying for funding and we will be delivering a Local Authority conference in July. We are also developing a website and other publicity materials, recruiting young people to become team members and starting an Anti-bullying Partnership Team at Wath. 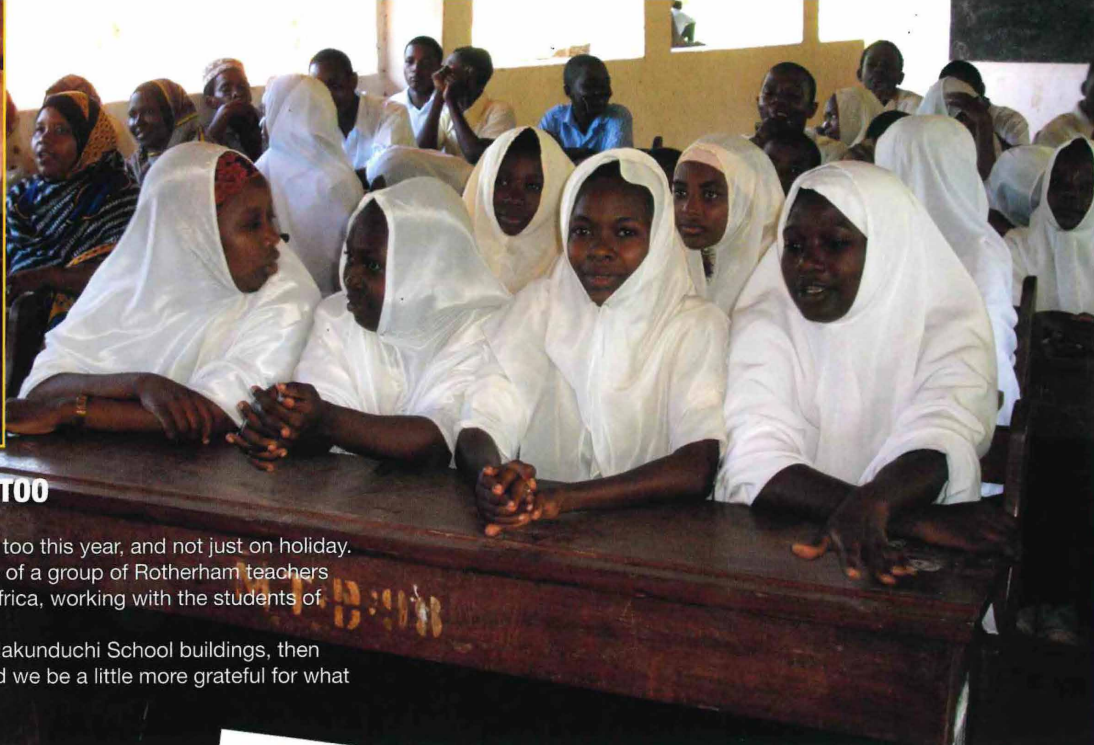
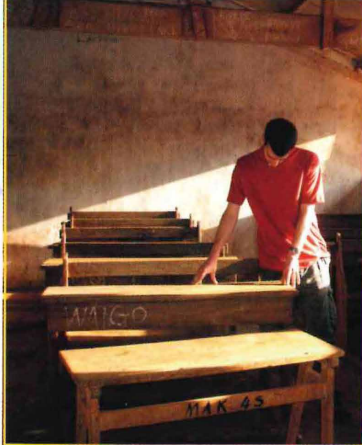


YEAR 10 IN THE DRAGONS' DEN

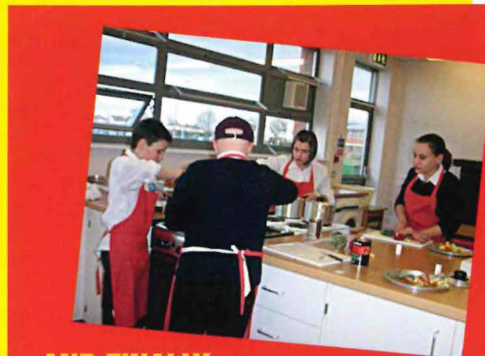
